Go on a scavenger hunt in your backyard or park. Keep track of what you find by marking the "Done" column. Stay safe—don't pick up anything sharp or unsafe. Ask if you're unsure.

Who	The "Expedition" Task	Sensing the Wood	Done
Piglet	Something Soft	Can you find moss or a petal as soft as a Piglet's ears?	
Pooh	Something Honey-Colored	Look for a leaf, a stone, or a flower the color of a "smackeral" of honey.	
Owl	A Wise Sound	Close your eyes for 60 seconds. What is the quietest sound you can hear?	
Tigger	A Bouncy Branch	Find a fallen stick or a low branch that looks like it has a "Tigger-ish" spring to it.	
Eeyore	A Thoughtful Gift	Find a smooth pebble or a bright leaf to keep in your own "Thoughtful Spot" at home.	
Kanga and Roo	A Pocket Treasure	Find something small enough to fit inside a pocket (like an acorn or a tiny seed pod).	

# How to Play a Proper Game of "Poohsticks"
